The Remain-in-Mexico policy of returning people to Mexico to await their court dates is the reason for the reduced number of asylum seekers passing through the bus station in recent months. Recent news reports state that over 51,000 asylum seekers are waiting in dangerous border towns in Mexico. Human Rights First in the *Guardian of London*, revealed that there have been at least 340 reports of rape, kidnapping, torture, and other violent attacks against the people who have been returned to Mexico to await their immigration hearings. The Women's Refugee Commission says that these reports are just the tip of the iceberg. Legal representation for these people is almost nonexistent. Ironically, this program is officially called Migrant Protection Protocols, but according to many news reports, the asylum seekers are being put in a situation that may be worse than the U.S. detention centers. October 12 Meeting Discusses Possibility of Expanding NolaGranny Work

Over 70 Grannies met at the Keller Community Center to listen to presentations from 4 groups who are doing great work for the Central Americans and Mexicans who were able to cross the border before it essentially closed. These groups offer other ways that we can help asylum seekers.

Immigration Services and Legal Advocacy (ISLA) provides direct service to asylum seekers held in the Louisiana detention centers. This is urgent work because no legal representation is provided by immigration services. The two attorneys and one paralegal handle cases primarily at the Pine Prairie Detention Center. They handle an average of six to eight cases at any time. Volunteer lawyers help with appeals. Their needs are great, as Louisiana is second only to Texas in the number of detainees in detention centers. Grannies can help with the paperwork load, fundraising, or grant writing.

Familias Unidos en Accion provides housing and social services to three recent immigrant families for up to three months until they are able to help themselves. For example, they discovered that one of the women they were helping had a talent for baking bread. Using her skills, she is now able to support herself in her own apartment.



Welcome to SignUpGenius. Once you sign the Volunteering Guidelines/ Ground Rules form, you will receive an invitation from sign-up genius. This means that you are in our system as a volunteer. Once you accept the invitation, you can create an account for yourself, and access SignUpGenius from anywhere. The SignUp program will remind you that you signed up to be a greeter or a packer 2 days in advance. It also allows you to cancel (please don't!) or swap your time with someone else.

When you sign up, you will be asked in the comment section for your phone number, whether you speak Spanish, and any comment you have. We ask you to answer these questions so the Lead will know who in the group speaks Spanish and how to reach you if necessary. These comments are available to anyone. Only the administrator can see the questions you answered when you first signed up.
