Grannies Participate in Lights for Liberty

On July 19th, 25 Grannies met at the bus station and walked to Poydras with the big banner to join other participants for an evening vigil in front of the ICE offices. Thanks to Yolanda Lorio for speaking during the vigil. During July, 696 protests occurred in all 50 states and Washington, D.C. Over 100,000 people joined together to protest the inhumane conditions faced by migrants. On July 26th, Kate Reynolds, representing the NOLA Grannies, participated in a Covington demonstration. People who attended donated \$400 to the Grannies.

ACLU UPDATES By Alanah Odoms Hebert, Executive Director AUGUST 13, 2019 - 12:30PM

Earlier this year, Immigration and Customs Enforcement quietly opened three new detention centers in Louisiana, all run by private for-profit prison companies. Louisiana's popular justice reinvestment reforms had begun to shrink the state's bloated prison population, but these private prison companies – along with federal immigration authorities – had different ideas.

The number of ICE detention facilities in Louisiana has grown from 2 in 2018 to 11 as of July 2019, shattering our state's commitment to reducing mass incarceration and subjecting thousands of immigrants and asylum-seekers to brutal and inhumane conditions.

Today Louisiana is poised to become the state with the highest number of immigrant detainees.

Many are being held in private, for-profit prisons or in local jails with a history of abysmal medical care and extreme brutality. For years, the ACLU has received serious complaints in these very facilities, where there have been reports of rampant violence, a lack of medical care, and people being placed in solitary confinement. The people being detained are so desperate they are staging hunger strikes and civil disobedience. In at least two facilities, protesters have been pepper-sprayed. The state that recently shed its title as prison capital of the world is now at risk of becoming the detention capital of the world. This is an unacceptable, inhumane and dangerous trend.

Louisiana taxpayers should not be subsidizing the forcible separation of children from their families or the mass detention of immigrants in brutal and dehumanizing conditions. That's why we're fighting back in court and in the halls of power to combat mass detention and hold public officials accountable for ending these abuses.

In May, the ACLU of Louisiana joined the Southern Poverty Law Center in suing the Trump administration for categorically denying release to hundreds of people who are languishing in immigration prisons after lawfully seeking asylum in the United States. The suit was filed on behalf of 12 named plaintiffs who, like hundreds of other migrants, sought asylum

at official U.S. points of entry in compliance with federal law and then were confined and sent to remote prisons in Louisiana and Alabama.

Together, we can stop this runaway train of mass detention and restore our commitment to freedom and justice for all.

PURCHASING POLICY NOLA GRANNIES

It is our policy that the funds our donors entrust to us be expended in the wisest, most costeffective manner. In furtherance of this policy we will adhere to the following guidelines:

- 1. Except for regular items purchased for kits, all expenditures exceeding \$50.00 must be approved in advance by the Treasurer or the Chief Purchasing Officer.
- 2. Printing requirements should be brought to the Treasurer or Chief Purchasing Officer. In most cases, commercial printing is much cheaper than printing on a home computer. Ink for home printers will not be reimbursed.
- 3. If there are concerns about the amount or necessity of the purchase, the Treasurer or Chief Purchasing may confer with the Grannies leadership team for final approval.
- 4. All expenditures must be supported by receipts and an expense report.
- 5. Expenses submitted for items not pre-approved may not be honored.

HOW TO GET REIMBURSED FOR GRANNY EXPENSES

Everything NOLA Grannies do starts with the shoppers who buy all the items we distribute to asylum seekers coming through the New Orleans Greyhound Terminal. We recognize your time and hard work, and want to make sure you are reimbursed as quickly and accurately as possible. Once you have completed your shopping, please do the following:

- 1. Take a photo of your receipt on your phone. The copy should show the entire receipt from top to bottom, so that the name of the store, the date of purchase, and every item purchased is clearly visible. Please do this before the receipt has a chance to get lost, crumpled, smeared or put through the laundry. If you pick up personal items on your shopping trip, please have those rung up as a separate order, so that only Granny items are on the receipt you submit. If you use a white background for the receipt when you take the photo, it saves expensive colored printer ink when receipts are printed for file. Expense reports /receipts should be filed within 60 days of purchase.
- 2. Complete the Expense Form. Break the totals into Kits, Toys, or Miscellaneous. Kits are plastic bags and everything that goes into them for the travelers. Miscellaneous includes items like sanitary napkins, diapers or wipes, which are given out on a need only basis. Toys is self-explanatory.
- 3. Email the receipt and expense form to pdriscoll1223@yahoo.com. In the email specify if you wish to be paid by check or Venmo. If requesting a check, please include your mailing address in the email. Checks may take up to a week to get to you, given the vagaries of USPS. For Venmo payments, download the app and send me a friend request @Pat-Driscoll-6. This should bring you to a photo of me in my pink pussy hat. Venmo puts your money directly into your bank account within 24 hours.

Welcome to SignUpGenius. Once you sign the Volunteering Guidelines/Ground Rules form, you will receive an invitation from sign-up genius. This means that you are in our system as a volunteer. Once you accept the invitation, you can create an account for yourself, and access SignUpGenius from anywhere. The SignUp program will remind you that you signed up to be a greeter or a packer 2 days in advance. It also allows you to cancel (please don't!) or swap your time with someone else.

When you sign up, you will be asked in the comment section for your phone number, whether you speak Spanish, and any comment you have. We ask you to answer these questions so the Lead will know who in the group speaks Spanish and how to reach you if necessary. These comments are available to anyone. Only the administrator can see the questions you answered when you first signed up.

Book Discussion: This Land is Our Land, An Immigrant's Manifesto by Suketu Mehta

The summer heat has driven me inside on these long, hot afternoons, so I decided to spend time each day learning more about the environment, white privilege and all the problems that seem to be coming to a head as we approach 2020. We all have friends and relatives with whom we strongly disagree, and with facts, we can begin to defend ourselves from the bigots and science deniers.

My most recent read, This Land is Our Land, An Immigrant's Manifesto by Suketu Mehta, has been an eye-opener for me, as it delves into the historic reasons for the current immigration struggle worldwide. The book begins with stories and personal struggles going on today in the United States and worldwide. It then takes the reader through the nightmares of colonization in which conquerors pillaged and oppressed poor lands and peoples throughout the world, including India, Africa, and South and Central America. The author goes on to explain the new colonialism, which is the rise of worldwide corporations that reap the benefits without paying taxes, and the numbers are supported with good research. Tied closely to these issues are the disasters of wars and climate change which drive people from their homes in search of refuge.

The facts are well documented, with fifty pages of annotations, but the book remains easy to read and is very understandable.

Mehta has included concrete examples, as well as facts and figures that are alarming but indisputable:

- --how many people are affected
- --how much wealth is accumulated in tax shelters
- --how land and resources are exploited to the detriment of indigenous people
- --how immigrants are left with little choice but to move

--how different the lifestyles are between the occupiers and the immigrants trying to flee the damage. One image that I cannot get out of my mind is that of an encampment of immigrants waiting months willing to pay all their savings to get on any kind of boat to cross to Spain, and they are camped next to yachts of the uber wealthy who are free to travel anywhere.

On completing this book, we are left with the knowledge that immigrants are coming, because they have no choice, the wealthy countries are causing this, and we will be in the same boat unless we make changes very soon.
